UGA MENTOR PROGRAM CIRCLES OF SUCCESS: MENTOR FAQ

Interested in group mentoring? Read below to learn a bit more about this process and how to get started!

WHAT IS A CIRCLE OF SUCCESS?

• A Circle of Success is a group mentoring model, allowing at least one mentor to engage with a group of between 2–8 students.

HOW IS GROUP MENTORING DIFFERENT THAN A 16-WEEK CONNECTION?

• Even though the group is connected for 16-weeks, the main difference, besides there being a group of students, is that we work with the mentor to recruit students to join the Circle. This varies from a 1:1 16-week connection, where students are the ones reaching out on their own.

WHAT IS EXPECTED OF THE MENTOR LEADING A CIRCLE?

The Mentor is expected, once matched, to do the initial outreach to students through the
platform. This message can provide a brief welcome/introduction, and it should also be used to
schedule the first meeting. From there, it is up to each group to decide the cadence and topics
of each subsequent session.

HOW DO I EXPRESS INTEREST IN LEADING A CIRCLE?

- All you have to do is complete a quick interest form, which can be found on the right side of your profile after you log in!
- Completing this form will prompt our team to reach out and set up a quick call to talk through logistics and answer any questions you have about the process.

HOW DO STUDENTS LEARN ABOUT THIS OPPORTUNITY?

• Mentees in the platform will receive an email inviting them to join the group. We curate a list of students to invite based on the Mentor's areas of interest/expertise. For example, if you are wanting to lead a group on leadership, that may appeal to all majors whereas if you want to just focus on your industry/career area, we will invite mentees who've noted that same interest.

WHAT HAVE OTHER MENTORS SAID ABOUT CIRCLES?

- Mentors have enjoyed watching the community built among the students, especially as they realize their peers often have the same questions and concerns they do.
- Mentors have shared scheduling can be a challenge, so taking that into account early and
 having that discussion with the group can be helpful. Being super clear about meeting
 times/expectations is a best practice.
- Several Mentors shared they thought they needed to prepare content for each session, but realized the students preferred a less formal conversation-but this is up to each mentor's style!
